APRIL LEARNING WORKSHOP

Starting at 7 p.m., Tuesday, April 4, 2023 via Zoom, our 7th virtual Learning Workshop topic of the 2022-2023 season is, (**Tying Your Collection to a Calendar**).

In other words, appropriate dates.

The format could be a 'show & tell' of dated items relating to or produced on specific occasions.

These could include: Birthdays; anniversaries; social and special



occasions such as a Moon Landing; world events ranging from good to tragic — such as U.S. President

John F. Kennedy's assassination on Nov. 22, 1963; the horrific Sept. 11, 2001 hijacked passenger aircraft attack on New York city that claimed 2,996 lives and forever called '9/11'; a war's start or finish; festivals, plus cacheted covers for philatelic exhibitions. The list goes on.

Some people collect covers cancelled with slogans, some of which include dates for special events, which is a nice and somewhat challenging commemorative topic.

Days in the lives of special people could also be worth pursuing: A coronation; an abdication; a major election; a political leader's first or last day in office. Postmarked stamps could be from those days, or from another time period that echoes the subject. For instance: If you collect Queen Victoria stamps, perhaps

include one with a postmark dated May 24 — the day she was born in 1819. An album page featuring definitives depicting Canada's other monarchs could have an appropriate birthday-dated one at the top. Hint, Queen Elizabeth II was born April 21, 1926, her son and successor, King Charles III, on Nov. 14, 1948.

Collection'? I recently saw a Canadian dealer's online offering of 1870-97 Small Queen definitives cancelled with different dates, one for most days of a month. A WTSC member said he'll be happy to show similar pages from his collection, which likely took awhile to assemble!

Dating from takeoffs that began more than a century ago, First Flight covers are popular, usually with cachets or rubber-stamped artwork plus text identifying locales plus the service's inauguration date on accompanying postmarks. More recently, Canada's first

successful flight, by the Silver Dart biplane at Baddeck, Nova Scotia in

1909, has been featured on two commemoratives, with corresponding First Day Covers produced.

Finally, on that note, FDCs are readily available. But how about envelopes bearing stamps cancelled with a regular postmark the day they were released? Such covers are not as easy to find.

As with all Learning Workshops, participants are invited to share treasures from their collections. Whether you register your items

early or reveal them at the right moment as a show-and-tell, this topic offers another great opportunity.

FLIGHT IN CANADA

Radio Reception Cinderellas, by WTSC member Don Hedger

Philatelists of a certain age will remember the "crystal radio"- no batteries, just a "cats' whisker" to tune, a long wire antenna, and headphones. While radio, or wireless, was around prior to and during WWI, it wasn't until the early 1920s that commercial radio stations were popping up in every city in North America. In those early years of AM radio (no FM or TV yet perfected for the general public) new stations grew from less than 100 to more than 500 in 1922 and well over 800 by 1960s. This included Canada, the U.S.A, Mexico, and Cuba.

Most of those stations, to promote reception, issued "verified reception" stamps, an example of which is shown here

from CFCA Toronto. When the station was heard, the date, time, and frequency along with 10 cents was sent to station to confirm reception and in return the staff would send a confirmation by station card/cover with a "verified reception" stamp attached or included in the letter. There were a plethora of philatelists or stamp collectors worldwide in the early years after WWI; the collection of Cinderellas that confirmed radio reception was a natural extension of the hobby. In fact, there were albums available with station call signs, frequencies, city names and provinces so that a collector could keep track of reception stamps from the radio stations.



These stamps were printed by the American Bank Note and produced for EKKO Co. Chicago, as in the example shown you will note EKKO letters, top left, clockwise in each corner. All Canadian stamps featured a Beaver, the U.S. ones depicted an Eagle. A couple of rare stamps are known to have an Eagle; those of CKNC in Toronto and CKAC in Montreal.

The short history of CFCA, owned and operated by the Toronto Star's owner Joseph Atkinson. Mr. Atkinson got the idea to promote the Star through radio from his son, an amateur (Ham) radio operator with station license 3EC. The Star, through radio "Star Concerts" and in conjunction with CITCO (Canadian Independent Telephone Co.) began in late 1921 to produce concerts from the WWI Christie St. Military Hospital (Christie and Dupont streets, Toronto). These were aired on 9AH and later became CFCA. Broadcasting was on 400m or 750kc at a power of 100 watts. The antenna for this station was a 5-wire, flat (horizontal) top, mounted on two 80ft towers on the Star building of the time. In early 1922, the station call sign 9AH was replaced by CFCA broadcasting concerts from the old CGE plant on Wallace Ave and Ward St.

By 1923, CFCA was broadcasting hockey games from the Mutual St. Arena with announcer Foster Hewitt, who used a telephone for a microphone. In 1924 it moved its studios to Yonge and St. Clair streets, where in 1928 it ceased operating as CFCA (sold to Ted Rogers) and became CFRB 1010; the "RB" stands for "Rogers Batteryless".

This is a short synopsis of the beginnings of radio, the Cinderellas for radio stations to verify reception, and the production and distribution of the related stamps.



WELCOME TO THE FIRST NATIONAL "UP TO 2 PAGES" EXHIBITION

At the <u>Québec City Old Paper Show</u> (28-29 October 2023)

After the great success of its 1st edition, which welcomed nearly 500 visitors over two days, the second edition of the **Québec City Old Paper Show**, which will take place next October 28-29 at the Patro Roc-Amadour in Québec City, has in store for us a great surprise! Indeed, the first national "Up to 2 Pages "exhibition will be organized there.

Collectors, if you hold an exceptional item, that is to say unique, rare or simply unusual, curious, funny or bizarre, in short an exceptional piece, which is commonly called a "talking piece", well this exhibition will be an opportunity for you to show it!

Hugo Deshaye and Grégoire Teyssier, the co-organizers of the Québec City Old Paper Show, explain the concept:

"Many collectors, whether they are philatelists, lovers of postal history, marcophily or historical documents, often hold real treasures, but rarely have the opportunity to share them. The exhibition we are organizing is an opportunity for these collectors to show their treasure to the general public. No need to embark on the long and tedious work of assembling a collection of several pages on several frames, since here, a single piece presented on a single page is enough! It's simple, fast, and effective! We hope that with this exhibition concept, many collectors will want to present, on a single page, their hidden treasure. At the same time, the public will be able to come and admire these exceptional pieces which will be brought together in one place".

At the choice of the exhibitors, the presentation may or may not be judged. If judged, it will be judged by a panel of recognized judges. The judging criteria will be roughly the same as for traditional exhibits: Importance, a good title - clear and precise, a nice presentation, appropriate research and one or more well-arranged piece(s) on one or two ($8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$) inch page(s). We have developed a new revolutionary scoring grid adapted to the judging of "Up to 2 Pages" exhibits.

The public will also be invited to choose the best presentations in each of the 3 main categories: <u>Philately</u> (which also includes postal history, marcophily, thematic, subject, first days, stationeries, etc.); <u>Illustrated postcards</u> and finally, <u>historical documents</u>.



The 2nd **Québec City Old Paper Show** will therefore be an opportunity for collectors to share their treasures and for the general public to come and admire them. An awards ceremony and dinner will be held on Saturday evening at the Québec Yacht Club.

All the details (prospectus, new judging grid, registration form and details) will soon be available online on the Show's website, but can be requested now by contacting Grégoire Teyssier at <u>gteyssier@videotron.ca</u>

And as usual, on site, about twenty dealers of postal history, postcards, postage stamps, old papers and books, coming from the four corners of the Province, but also from Ontario and the Maritimes; two days of conferences; the presence of La Société d'histoire postale du Québec, la Société philatélique de Québec, le Club des cartophiles Québécois. Door prizes, philatelic souvenirs, and much much more.

In short, a weekend not to be missed in the beautiful and historic Quebec City!
