May Learning Workshop

"Slogans" are the subject of the eighth 2016-17 season Learning Workshop.

Return with us to thrilling days of yesteryear when some of the millions of envelopes processed at post offices across Canada bore slogans that promoted a wide variety of subjects.

For six years starting in 1896, the Post Office Department used machine cancels that applied either images of flags or horizontal bars to stamps, beside circular-dated postmarks. New machines in 1902 began applying wavy-line cancels. Ten years later, in 1912, slogan cancels were introduced, struck with curved cast metal plates fitted into each machine.

The texts encouraged and promoted events including horse shows and fairs, supported hospitals and various First World War fund-raisers. Later slogans encouraged use of post office services including buying stamps from posties and the new air mail system.

Hand- or electrically-operated machines pulled covers through a platform equipped with dies that also applied circular dated cancels, leaving them ready to be sorted for dispatching to their intended destination.

Slogan cancels continued until recent years, with postal code-promoting far exceeding other topics.

Few post offices now use the old-style machines. Instead, high-speed mail-handling centers have computer-driven envelope-handling systems that apply dot matrix postal codes.

Slogans can be added, but present-day event promotions tend to be applied to mail by rubber hand cancellers which can be ordered from Canada Post, for use at local post offices.


Several members are preparing to discuss this fascinating topic at our meeting on Tuesday, May 2.










APS Stamp March (Madness) Competition 2017
